Our recent activities on behalf of the GNSCCPA have focused on the following key areas:


- 1. Mariposa Cold Room Project Update;

This report is not intended to be a full description of all activities but rather, provides highlights and information on the direction of our activities to keep the Board of Directors informed and to ensure adherence to the vision and guidance imparted to RAI-N by the GNSCCPA and its leadership. Throughout this period, RAI-N has maintained active and frequent communications with Ms. Allison Moore, Mr. Bruce Bracker and various other members of the Board of Directors in order to ensure that we have a fully coordinated approach to our efforts. RAI-N stands ready to address any issue, concern or suggestion that may arise from this report and from our on-going dialogue with the leadership and the Board of Directors.

#### 1. MARIPOSA COLD ROOM PROJECT UPDATE

- Work with the General Services Administration (GSA) continues on the project.
- GSA has provided initial response to changes suggested by Technical Team on the Revocable License Agreement.
- Technical discussions continue between PA and GSA on architectural requirements, including the easements for the electric energy service.
- Port Authority is working with the architects to complete 90% design for submission.

#### 2. RIBBON CUTTING CEREMONY FOR SR-189 MODERNIZATION PROJECT



- On March 11, 2022, the Arizona Department of Transportation, along with the Arizona-Mexico Commission and the Port Authority, hosted a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony marking the completion of the \$134 million SR-189 modernization project.
- This is a project that ranks among the most significant achievements by the Port Authority in working with a broad spectrum of local, state and federal stakeholders to help create the structure that would ultimately pay for the project.
- The City of Nogales' and Santa Cruz County's commitment of 50% of their allocation of Overweight Permit Fees helped to ensure the success of the project.

## 3. LETTER SUPPORTING SANTA CRUZ COUNTY RAISE GRANT APPLICATION

- On March 21, 2022, the Port Authority sent a letter to US Secretary of Transportation, Peter Buttigieg, in support of the application by Santa Cruz County for a \$1 million RAISE Grant to pay for the planning necessary for a multimodal facility at Rio Rico.
- "In order to ensure the sustainable growth and development of our binational community, it is imperative that we offer a multimodal alternative to support the global logistics needs of industry," stated the letter to the Secretary.
- Having a multimodal facility at Rio Rico will greatly benefit the mining sector but will also offer alternative modes of transportation to support both the manufacturing sector and the movement of agricultural commodities.
- Uncertainty about future fuel prices and truck-shipping costs means that having a rail alternative for long-haul shipments could contribute to the competitiveness of the Arizona-Mexico Corridor.


## 4. PORT AUTHORITY JOINS CBP STAFFING COALITION LETTER

- On March 21, 2022, a letter was sent to Senators Gary Peters and John Cornyn thanking them for introducing S.3850, the Securing America's Ports of Entry Act, that would increase the authorized number of Customs and Border Protection officers by 600 annually.
- This bill would also "provide better information about CBP's infrastructure needs at its ports of entry, as well as the agency's increasing reliance on reimbursable services and temporary duty assignments to cover system-wide staffing shortfalls."
- The Port Authority is on record as advocating for a revision of the staffing model that is utilized to determine the staffing requirements at ports of entry. In response

and in anticipation of conditions and activities at the ports of entry, it is imperative that such issues as continuity of operations, response to asylum applicants, and other growing responsibilities be considered in determining adequate staffing for each port.

### 5. PORT AUTHORITY HOSTS CANADIAN CONSUL DURING VISIT TO NOGALES

## 6. US CONSULATE GENERAL LAUNCHES BINATIONAL WATER WORKING GROUP



- In response to the ongoing stormwater issues that continue to impact the Ambos Nogales region, on Mar h 22, 2022, the US Consulate General, under the leadership of Consul General Laura Biedebach, created a Binational Working Group to look into these issues.
- The working group is comprised of various committees that will look at:
- Studies
- Infrastructure
- Regulations

## 7. BINATIONAL MEETING ON SONORA PROPOSAL FOR THE RELOCATION OF THE RAILROAD AT NOGALES

- On March 24, 2022, the US Consulate General in Nogales, Sonora, in coordination
  with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Mexico hosted a binational meeting to
  discuss the proposal by the State of Sonora to relocate the railroad crossing at
  Nogales.
- The meeting included federal agencies from both sides of the border. Presentations were made by the Sonora Department of Infrastructure and Urban Development (SIDUR) and the Mexican Ministry of Defense.
- SIDUR's presentation focused on the need to provide more green spaces for the Nogales, Sonora community and to address some of the safety issues surrounding the rail crossing. SEDENA's presentation provided some preliminary alternative routes to the east, including some tunneling that would be required for the proposed route.
- The US Department of State provided some general guidance on the Presidential Permit process that would be required for such a proposal.
- Among the participants were representatives of Ferromex and Union Pacific, both
  of which offered to provide any additional information that authorities may
  require.
- The presentations did not include any information on alternative routes on the US side.
- Representing Arizona were:
  - o John Halikowski, Director, Arizona Department of Transportation
  - Mark Sanders, International Affairs, ADOT
  - Jaime Chamberlain, on behalf of the Port Authority
- We continue to monitor progress on this proposal.





- During the current session of the Arizona State Legislature, HB2396 was a proposal to allocate \$50 million towards a series of transportation projects in rural parts of Arizona.
- Because the bill included a number of projects that were not part of the state transportation system. The Chair of the House Transportation Committee requested a revision of the bill to only include projects that were part of the state system.
- Later versions of the bill included the I-19 Interchanges at Ruby Road and Rio Rico Drive.
- Special thanks to Kevin Adam of the Rural Transportation Advocacy Council for the providing updates on the progress of these bills.

## 9. ADOT AND SIDUR LEADERSHIP MEET TO ENSURE ALIGNMENT ON TRANSPORTATION INITIATIVES

- On March 28, 2022, Director Halikowski of ADOT hosted his counterpart from Sonora, Heriberto Aguilar of SIDUR for an extensive discussion on a variety of crossborder transportation initiatives, which included:
  - Arizona-Sonora Border Master Plan
  - The Modernization of the DeConcini port of entry
  - Relocation of the railroad crossing at Nogales.
- ADOT presented the new logo to for the Border Master Plan.
- Joining Secretary Aguilar was David Figueroa, Sonora State Representative in Arizona.

Dear Secretary Buttigieg,

On behalf of the Greater Nogales Santa Cruz County Port Authority, I write to express our support for the Santa Cruz County's application for a \$1 million 2022 RAISE planning grant. In order to ensure the sustainable growth and development of our binational community, it is imperative that we offer a multimodal alternative to support the global logistics needs of industry. The grant would help pay for a development plan for a state of the art, efficient and scalable multimodal yard at Rio Rico, Arizona.

The development plan includes a market demand study, cost-benefit analysis and conceptual plans for a multi-modal facility that would offer a truck-to-rail/rail-to-truck back-to-back operation.

Our traditional sectors of industry (mining and fresh produce) have relied heavily on truck traffic for several decades but supply chains and global competitive cost structures demand that industry be able to choose what is the best mode of transportation for their products or commodities. There are also several environmental advantages that could be afforded by choosing rail over truck for long-haul shipments, an option that does not exist locally at this time.

Since our founding in 2004, the Greater Nogales Santa Cruz County Port Authority has organized critical public-private initiatives to improve our ports of entry and enhance the quality of life for our residents.

We are committed to supporting this project in all phases of its development and operation, as it will help us protect and create local jobs in logistics, produce and mining while enhancing our competitiveness vis a vis other trade corridors and other regions of the world.

Dear Senators Peters and Cornyn:

As stakeholders interested in the facilitation activities of Customs and Border Protection (CBP) at land, sea, and air ports-of-entry around the globe, we thank you for introducing S. 3850, the *Securing America's Ports of Entry Act*, which would increase the authorized number of CBP officers by 600 annually to help the agency meet its current and future staffing needs. The bill also would provide better information about CBP's infrastructure needs at its ports-of-entry, as well as much needed transparency and accountability regarding the agency's increasing reliance on reimbursable services agreements and temporary duty assignments to cover its system-wide staffing shortfalls.

We share your commitment to ensuring that America's borders remain safe, secure, and efficient for all users, while enhancing our global competitiveness through the facilitation of legitimate travel and trade. CBP's most recent workload staffing model, which used data from the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, still showed a shortage of nearly 1,000 CBP officers across the system. Since the model was most recently run, the pandemic has subsided and international trade and travel volumes are expected to surpass pre-pandemic levels in many locations. Current staffing levels already fail to address the growing demand of travel and trade at our ports-of-entry today, and we anticipate the workload staffing model will indicate drastically higher CBP staffing shortages at the ports-of-entry in subsequent runs. Providing additional CBP officers at this time of growing volumes of international passengers and cargo in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic will both reduce lengthy wait times and facilitate new economic opportunities in communities throughout the United States.

Increasing CBP officer staffing is an economic driver for the U.S. economy. According to the Joint Economic Committee (JEC), "every day 1.1 million people and \$5.9 billion in goods legally enter and exit through the ports of entry." CBP estimates that the annual hiring of an additional 600 CBP officers at the ports-of-entry could increase yearly economic activity by over \$1 billion and result in the addition of over 17,000 new jobs.

While the volume of commerce and passengers crossing our borders is on the rise once again, CBP staffing has not kept pace with demand. Long wait times at our ports-of-entry lead to delays and uncertainty, which can increase supply-chain costs and cause travelers to miss their connections. According to the U.S. Department of Commerce, border delays result in losses to output, wages, jobs, and tax revenue due to decreases in spending by companies, suppliers, and consumers. The travel industry estimates long CBP wait times discourage international visitors, who spend an average of \$4,200 per visit, from traveling to the United States. JEC research also finds border delays cost the U.S. economy upwards of \$5 billion each year.

Thank you for your leadership on these important matters. Please let us know if we can be of any assistance to your efforts.


