- Dialogue between the GNSCCPA Technical Team and Customs and Border Protection and the General Services Administration continue with bi-weekly conference calls.

### 3. US-MEXICO MINI BINATIONAL MEETING


 Recognizing that the US-Mexico Binational Bridges and Border Crossings meeting has been postponed by the US and Mexican governments, we were able to leverage the presence of several key federal agency representatives and schedule a Mini Binational Session to focus on Arizona's Ports of Entry, including the need to Modernize the DeConcini Port of Entry.

- Chairman Valencia was able to make a presentation on the current conditions of the port and the impacts it is having on the community, particularly on the downtown merchants.
- During the meeting, Director Lupe Ramirez of the Tucson Field Office of Customs and Border Protection (CBP) stressed that DeConcini is in need of major investments in order to ensure that CBP can fulfil its mission.
- During the meeting, Juan Ciscomani, Senior Advisor to Governor Ducey, stressed that the Governor is supportive of the top priority projects at the ports of entry.
- Director John Halikowski, of the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT), indicated that he is prepared to have ADOT advance the assessment process to better understand the infrastructure needs at DeConcini.

### 4. NOGALES WASTEWATER FAIRNESS ACT INTRODUCED IN THE HOUSE

- Congressman Raul Grijalva, in his continued efforts to find long term solutions for the issues surrounding the International Outfall Interceptor (IOI), has once again introduce the Nogales Wastewater Fairness Act.
- The Bill has passed the House which includes an amendment to direct the International Boundary and Water Commission (IBWC) to set aside an additional \$4 million within the IBWC's budget to clarify the responsibility for the maintenance and operation of the IOI. The IBWC has an existing \$21 million to repair the IOI.
- Congressman Grijalva is encouraging the US Senate to take up the bill and pass it.

- 6. AUDUBON REPORT ON IMPACTS OF SANTA CRUZ RIVER FOR ARIZONA
  - The Audubon Society released a study on the impacts of Santa Cruz River to the Arizona Economy.
  - In the article below, the Audubon Society makes the argument that investing in the much-needed repairs of the IOI are important for the health of the Santa Cruz River.

International Infrastructure Issues Threaten Arizona's Santa Cruz River

Why fixing a nine-mile sewage pipe is crucial for people and birds. (UPDATE 5/28/19) Arizona's 2019-2020 budget included more than \$2.5 billion dollars for the International Outfall Interceptor Project.

Between southern Arizona in the United States and northern Sonora in Mexico, there is a shared piece of infrastructure failing to do its job. The International Outfall Interceptor (IOI) is a massive pipe that carries wastewater (sewage from Nogales, Sonora in Mexico and Nogales, Arizona in the United States to a wastewater treatment plant in Rio Rico, Arizona. There, the water is treated, purified, and put back into the Upper Santa Cruz River, which then flows 17 miles in a stretch that would normally run dry without the treated wastewater to sustain it.

The problem is that the nine-mile IOI pipe carrying raw sewage into Arizona for treatment and purification has far exceeded its engineered life and suffers from a backlog of critical maintenance. Pipe breaks are an all-too-regular occurrence, causing raw sewage spills that contaminate the local waterways and threaten the health of the environment and the nearby communities and industries. One event alone <u>during the 2017 monsoon season</u> resulted in the release of approximately 27 million gallons of raw sewage.

Despite these challenges, the purified wastewater is critical for the river, the aquifer, and the habitat the water sustains. The <u>Upper Santa Cruz River is an</u> <u>Important Bird Area</u>. Thanks in large part to the river and its associated riparian habitat, Gray Hawk, Bell's Vireo, and Yellow-billed Cuckoo thrive in this corridor. The flowing river is also a critical component to groundwater recharge in the Santa Cruz Active Management Area (an area whose groundwater use is regulated by the Arizona Department of Water Resources).

The city and surrounding area of Nogales in Sonora supplies more than 90 percent of the wastewater treated in Arizona. To ensure this water continues to flow into the United States and sustains the flow of the Santa Cruz River, the infrastructure must be fixed. Without repair, we will continue to experience contaminated flows or we may risk losing the flow of wastewater from Mexico altogether.

Thankfully, the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality, among other domestic and international stakeholders, are working to acquire funds to repair the IOI pipe. Repairs are estimated at \$48 million in total, with \$26 million needed to start the first few phases. Numerous public and private organizations have committed to contributing funds necessary to start the project; however, \$2.5 million is still needed. The Arizona Legislature is currently considering <u>House Bill</u> 2448, sponsored by State Senator Frank Pratt, R-8. If enacted, it would appropriate the final \$2.5 million to this project and allow the International Boundary and Water Commission—the binational organization tasked with maintenance of the infrastructure—to begin work immediately.

In order to maintain a healthy and flowing Upper Santa Cruz River, this issue must be addressed. It has <u>plagued the nearby communities</u> for far too long, putting public health and our environment at risk.

Additionally, Santa Cruz County's waterways support a vibrant outdoor recreation economy: Audubon Arizona recently released <u>a report</u> that found outdoor recreation along water <u>in Santa Cruz County</u>, the smallest county in Arizona, generates \$142 million dollars in economic output and support 1,600 jobs in the state. Birders, hikers, families, and the local community know that this is a gem in Arizona worth protecting.

### 7. GSA TO CONDUCT EIS FOR NEW FMCSA FACILITIES

- On June 21, 2019, the General Services Administration (GSA) published a new notice in the Federal Register announcing a series of hearing and stakeholder meetings regarding the proposal to build new truck safety inspection facilities for the Federal Motor Carriers Safety Administration (FMCSA) at several ports of entry, including Nogales and San Luis, Arizona.
- This proposal stands to dramatically impact the flow of commercial conveyances at Arizona's ports of entry by creating a redundant and inefficient flow of traffic.
- Additionally, there is little space for the construction of new facilities.
- The suggested course of action continues to be the <u>No-Build alternative</u> that encourages colocation with the Arizona Department of Transportation.

#### Notice of Intent To Prepare an **Environmental Impact Statement for** Land Ports of Entry

AGENCY: Public Buildings Service (PBS), General Services Administration (GSA). ACTION: Revised Notice of Intent; meeting updates.

SUMMARY: The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and the GSA have partnered to develop a program of projects at a number of Land Ports of Entry (LPOEs) so that FMCSA agents can safely and effectively inspect both commercial truck and bus traffic. GSA intends to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to analyze the potential impacts from the proposed construction of six (6) inspection facilities at five (5) different LPOEs in both California and Arizona. A NOI was published concerning the EIS and scoping meetings on May 23, 2019. The revised Notice of Intent is to notify interested parties that dates for the scoping meetings have changed for the two (2) Arizona Sites. Meetings for the California scoping meetings have not changed.

DATES: The views and comments of the public are necessary to help determine the scope and content of the environmental analysis. Interested parties are encouraged to attend and provide written comments regarding the

scope of the EIS and the proposed facilities by August 2, 2019.

### SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

#### Background

The FMCSA mission includes ensuring that commercial vehicles entering the United States (U.S.) and travelling on U.S. Highways are operating safely and within current U.S. standards. To achieve this mission and ensure safety on public highways FMCSA must inspect commercial and bus traffic at points of destination or origin, the U.S.-Mexico Border being a main point of origin. FMCSA inspectors currently inspect

both bus and commercial truck traffic at multiple LPOEs along the U.S.-Mexico Border in both California and Arizona at facilities that were not built for their needs and at sites which do not allow for thorough, safe inspection of vehicles. In April of 2018, FMCSA received funding from the Committees of Congress to develop, design, and construct facilities that will allow them to meet their mission goals safely and effectively.

It has been determined that to achieve this mission, six (6) inspection facilities will be needed at five (5) different LPOEs in both California and Arizona. The two (2) Arizona LPOEs are described below:

- Nogales Mariposa, AZ (Commercial
- Truck Inspection) San Luis II, AZ (Commercial Truck Inspection)

#### Alternatives

The EIS will consider three Alternatives; a "preferred build alternative" for six (6) facilities at five (5) locations, a "smaller footprint" build alternative for six (6) facilities at the same five (5) locations, and a "no action" alternative. The alternatives for the Two (2) Arizona locations are described below:

#### San Luis II LPOE, AZ

The proposed truck inspection facility rould be located on the northern edge of the LPOE property line. A portion of the site work would be constructed on newly acquired Federal land that will allow access from the site after hours. Site work would require the clearing of the existing site, extension of existing utilities for electrical, sanitary sewer and water, paving of the truck path, and relocating the existing CBP impound lot. Facility construction would include an inspection canopy with pits and an FMCSA administration building. The other build alternative would consist of a smaller facility footprint on the same location.

#### Nogales Mariposa LPOE, AZ

The proposed truck inspection facility would be located on privately owned land, north of the existing LPOE. Site work would require the clearing of the existing site, extension of existing utilities for electrical, sanitary sewer and water, paving of the truck path. Facility construction would include an inspection canopy with pits and a FMCSA administration building. The other build alternative would consist of a smaller facility footprint on the same location.

The "no action" alternative assumes that no new facility would be constructed at any of the sites and the LPOEs and FMCSA operations would continue to operate under current conditions.

#### 8. CONGRESSIONAL LETTER ON SEASONALITY

### 9. LETTER SUPPORTING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FOR CBP OPERATIONS

- On June 25, 2019, in an effort led by the US Chamber of Commerce, dozens of organizations, including the Port Authority and the Fresh Produce Association of the Americas, signed on to the letter urging the US Congress to provide supplemental funding to Customs and Border Protection in order to ensure the Agency can continue to fulfil its mission.
- As stated in the letter, "This funding is needed to support CBP Officer (CBPO) staffing, overtime, and travel costs related to ongoing redeployment of CBPOs from POEs to address the national emergency situation along the southern border. This funding will ensure that the cross-border commerce critical to our economy is not impeded."

- **10.** GOVERNORS OF ARIZONA AND SONORA SIGN JOINT LETTER IN SUPPORT OF USMCA RATIFICATION

### **12.** MEXICO RATIFIES T-MEC


- On June 19, 2019 the Mexican Senate voted overwhelmingly to ratify the USMCA, or T-MEC as it is referred to in Mexico.
- Mexico became the first country to ratify this historic agreement. It is hoped that this will provide added pressure for both the US and Canada to move with their respective ratification processes.









Dear Ambassador Lighthizer:

We are writing to express our concerns about reports that the administration may be exploring the inclusion of a so-called "seasonality" provision in legislation implementing the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA). As Members of Congress who support free, fair, and reciprocal trade between the United States and its trading partners around the globe, we strongly object to adding any seasonality provision that conflicts with the intent of the agreement.

We were pleased that a seasonality provision was not included in USMCA when the agreement was finalized by the U.S., Mexico, and Canada last year. Seasonality, whereby certain agricultural products could be subjected to numerous seasonal and regional dumping duties at various times throughout the year, runs counter to the spirit of a free trade agreement intended to tear down both tariffs and non-tariff barriers to trade.

Using USMCA as a vehicle for pursuing seasonal agriculture trade remedies risks pitting different regions of the country against each other. And, if successful, this tactic will result in higher prices for U.S. consumers, while reducing availability, selection, and quality in the supermarket aisle for items such as tomatoes, avocados, bell peppers, watermelons, strawberries and blueberries, just to name a few.

Consumers in the U.S. currently enjoy the lowest food costs in the world, with just 6.4 percent of U.S. income going toward food. U.S. per capita consumption of fresh vegetables stood at 126.8 pounds per year in 1993, before the implementation of NAFTA. In 2016, U.S. per capita consumption of fresh vegetables had reached 145.1 pounds per year, a 14 percent increase.

Some fresh fruits and vegetables, however, simply are not available in sufficient volume from the U.S. in certain months. U.S. companies have found significant value in working with farms in Mexico and Canada to produce and export the foods that contribute to healthful eating habits for U.S. consumers.

We strongly oppose the inclusion of any agriculture seasonality provisions in USMCA implementing legislation, as they would run counter to consumer preferences, undermine the spirit of the trinational free trade agreement, and harm U.S. industries in order to artificially support a small segment of regional growers' interests.

Copy of Letter on CBP Supplemental Funding

### TO THE MEMBERS OF THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS:

As stakeholders interested in the activities of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Customs and Border Protection (CBP) at land, sea, and air ports-of-entry (POEs) around the globe, we urge you to support the Administration's request for supplemental appropriations to cover CBP operations for the remainder of this fiscal year. This funding is needed to support CBP Officer (CBPO) staffing, overtime, and travel costs related to ongoing redeployment of CBPOs from POEs to address the national emergency situation along the southern border. This funding will ensure that the cross-border commerce critical to our economy is not impeded.

U.S. businesses rely on the safe and efficient movement of goods and people across our borders. However, recent activities by CBP in responding to the situation at the southern border are having enormous impacts on this flow of goods and people. In April, CBP reassigned 545 officers from U.S.-Mexico POEs to support U.S. Border Patrol operations at the southern border, severely tightening inspection capacity at the border and other POEs, and dramatically increasing wait times. It took freight up to seven hours to cross at the Bridge of Americas in El Paso, Texas, in April 2019, whereas it took less than an hour to enter the U.S. at the same time last year. Similarly, it took freight four hours to cross into the U.S. at Otay Mesa, California, in April 2019, as compared to nearly two hours in April 2018.

In May, CBP increased the redeployment to 731 CBPOs, with 245 coming from U.S.-Mexico POEs and the remaining 486 from POEs along the northern border, as well as from airports and seaports throughout the U.S. It is not clear when these redeployments will end, but it is already having an impact. According to CBP's own onboard data and workload staffing model the agency is already operating at a deficit of 3,700 officers. So, every officer taken away from a POE is having a significant impact on processing goods and people. For instance, U.S. international hub airports like Chicago-O'Hare, New York's John F. Kennedy, Los Angeles International, San Francisco International, and Atlanta Hartsfield-Jackson International routinely saw wait times for non-U.S. citizens to clear Customs and Immigration of two and three hours since the beginning of April. We are also hearing reports that airports are experiencing increased delays and missed connections due to the redeployments.

We are increasingly concerned about how CBP's situation will impact the flow of goods and people at our POEs this summer. Already, CBP has announced it is suspending mandatory training so that it can keep more CBPOs at POEs. CBP is also planning to scale back services at its Global Entry enrollment centers in order to limit disruptions to airport customs processing. We understand that CBP is also exploring steps to limit the disruption of people disembarking cruise ships at sea ports.

Without additional funding, we are concerned that these examples will be the first in a series of increasingly serious disruptions to CBP's critical customs and security work, and to the movement of people and goods at our borders and POEs. We are also concerned that this

situation may force DHS to draw upon the resources of other DHS agencies to support CBP if Congress does not provide additional funding.

The critical issues that American businesses are facing because of the situation at the southern border require quick, decisive action so that our government can provide for both border security and the flow of travel and trade. As such, we ask that you provide the supplemental funding to help CBP respond effectively to the challenges it has to overcome now and in the immediate future.



With these principles in mind, we are jointly calling on both our countries to refocus national efforts on ratifying the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) or Tratado Mexico Estados Unidos y Canada (TMEC). This plan was the result of countless hours of negotiations — with concessions on all sides.
